We are delighted to announce our latest film show: an online screening of 'The Story of Plastic'. The Story of Stuff project was set up in 2007 to protest about our consumption-crazed culture, with a slogan of 'Better, not More'. 'The Story of Plastic' is the latest in their series of award-winning films which use animation to get their points across in a challenging but accessible way. The film takes a sweeping look at the man-made crisis of plastic pollution and the worldwide effect it is having on the health of our planet and the people who inhabit it. Coming after our Conversation Evening on plastic last year, and amid continuing concern for the amount of plastic in the environment, this is a timely topic for our latest film screening.

Guided Nature Walks

Stapleford Parish Pit Saturday 27 June, 2-3pm

(We are continuing with our plans for this walk, but note we shall be complying with whatever social distancing restrictions are in place at the time. If for any reason we have to cancel, we shall let you know.)

A wildflower walk led by 2G3S member John O’Boyle. There is uneven ground on the site so sturdy footwear is advised. There is no charge for this event.

Stapleford Chalk Pit is a small nature reserve adjoining Magog Downs, managed by a group of Friends under the trusteeship of the Parish Council. The pit was formed by the extraction of a hard chalk (clunch) for use as a building material and the repair of local roads. The Friends are working towards improving the rich grassland flora of the site. 70 wildflower species have so far been recorded. For those who came on this walk last year, it will be interesting to see how the site has developed.

Access: Try to come by foot or bike, but if you need to drive, and if the Magog Trust car park on Haverhill Road is open by then, you can leave your car there and walk back down the road towards Stapleford (note there is a parking charge for non-members of the Magog Downs). After 200 yards there is a signpost to the Pit just after the Gog Magog Cottages private road. Walk up the path and meet at the gate at the top.

Special thanks to Beth Atkin, who worked tirelessly on the day but also helped with the bookings (no mean feat!). Beth is going to be our lead person on Repair Cafes in future.

Another special mention to Emma Dyer at South Cambridgeshire District Council, who as ever organised the posters and this time took telephone bookings for us from those who do not have a computer – a first for us which we hope can be repeated.

The money we raised in donations has been split between the Church, 2G3S, Cambridge Carbon Footprint and Transition Cambridge. (CCF and Transition Cambridge provide support to all Cambs Repair Cafes, along with SCDC and Mackays of Cambridge who loan out a tool box for the repairers to use.)

CAMBRIDGESHIRE COUNTY COUNCIL

CLIMATE CHANGE AND ENVIRONMENT STRATEGY CONSULTATION

The consultation closed on 31 January; the council were due to approve the strategy in March but the meeting was postponed because of Covid-19.

AGRICULTURE AND ENVIRONMENT BILLS

The **Agriculture Bill** is currently in the Commons and due to have its Report Stage and Third Reading next Wednesday, 13 May. On 19 March the Commons also suspended progress on the **Environment Bill** until further notice.

SOUTH CAMBRIDGESHIRE DISTRICT COUNCIL: ZERO CARBON ACTION PLAN

Over the coming months the Council will be working to put flesh on the bones of their zero-carbon plans (you may remember that Councillor Martin Cahn led one of our Conversation Evenings about this last October). 
