Repair Cafes are **free events** (donations very welcome) where we match amazing repairers with people who need stuff fixing. The repairers are brilliant and can fix most things but there are no guarantees. Tea and cake available of course!

You can turn up with your broken item on the day, but we're usually very busy so it's **best to book it in using the booking button** here from 1 – 9 February inclusive



Bring along the following to be repaired and to pick up repair skills:

jewellery / jewellery cleaning sewing repairs (clean items only please) small household appliances small electrical items sewing machines computers bicycles general bits 'n' bobs

New feature: Recycling of small electrical items

During the event we will have a recycling bin for small electrical items which are beyond repair, so that they can be used for parts or broken down and recycled. This can be used both for items that we've looked at in the Repair Café, and for others that you wish to bring along to recycle. Most small items with a plug or a battery will be accepted, including:

- Electronic toys
- Kettles or toasters
- Hairdryers or straighteners
- · Cables and plugs
- Lamps
- Power tools
- Printers

We're sorry but we won't be able to take smoke alarms, damaged batteries, ammonia fridges, pressurised cylinders, laptops or screens, or items larger than 40cm in their biggest dimension.

Sustainability and open source

Open source is about sharing information for the greater good - open source software, open source hardware and open data. To help conserve the earth's resources and mitigate climate change we must be able to innovate, share and collaborate in a way that doesn't just benefit single companies or individuals.

I've been on a personal journey towards improved sustainability for many years. I was an early advocate of working from home, with the travel reduction it encourages (bicycle and trains being the preferred methods when I do have to visit clients or events). The home office I'm writing in today is heavily insulated and even in the UK in October the solar panels on our roof are currently generating enough to feed some of it back to the grid while powering the creation of this article. Over the 11 years we've lived here we have made our house hugely more energy efficient, reduced our waste and resource consumption. We also grow some of our own food, avoid buying things we don't need, buy second-hand and repair everything we can. In short, we're trying to live as sustainably as we can.

The last point is something I've taken even further having been a volunteer repairer and organiser for the local Repair Cafe group. One of the frustrating things one encounters when repairing items - particularly electronics - is the lack of information, help and spare parts provided by manufacturers which often actively work to prevent repair, and I've been encouraged to see the rise of Right to Repair initiatives.

The open source movement is clearly aligned with this aim. In a recent article, Software Conservancy Executive Director Karen M. Sandler writes:

"It is important to be able to repair products we already own. Even without supply chain challenges, the forced obsolescence of devices like TVs isn't in the best interest of the consumer or even the planet. This is another aspect of what we mean by 'ethical technology.' Throwing away a TV because its software is no longer supported by its manufacturer is not only wasteful, it has dire environmental consequences."

Solutions and information need to be available as widely as possible as building blocks for change. By sharing information and technology we can make a real contribution to the creation of a sustainable society.
