Book Club Thursday 25 August 7.30 pm



After an interesting evening talking about '**Doughnut Economics' by Kate Raworth** at our first meeting, we are again assembling at The Rose, Stapleford, at 7.30 pm on Thursday 25 August.

The book we have chosen this time is not so much theory, more one person's very readable account of how we can build a liveable future for all in response to the climate crisis. It is **A Bigger Picture: My Fight to Bring a New African Voice to the Climate Crisis** and is written by **Vanessa Nakate**, a climate activist from Uganda. Vanessa has noted that African countries bear a disproportionate share of the problems occasioned by the climate crisis, while at the same time black voices are not being heard as much as those of white activists.

The book has been recommended by Katie Williams, who will lead the discussion. Do come and join us at the meeting – having read the book is preferable but not compulsory; you might just want to find out about the ideas and join in the discussion. Your ideas for future books will also be very welcome.

Nature walks (Saturdays at 2 pm)



You are invited to join me for a walk around the Nine Wells nature reserve from 2 pm on Saturday 20 August to observe the interesting flora and fauna of this woodland site. Nine Wells is of historic and geological importance as the chalk springs act as the source for Hobson's Conduit and traditional water supply to Cambridge. Assemble at the noticeboard at the western entrance to the reserve (the one nearest the DNA path to Addenbrookes). Note: there is no car parking near to the site but it can be reached via a public footpath from Granham's Road or the National Cycle Network path that runs between Shelford and Addenbrookes (the DNA path).

As before stout footwear is advised and also long trousers as a precaution against any nettle/brambles. Sun protection is also advised if appropriate and water if it's a hot day. This walk will be at participants' own risk.

After this, our next walks will be: 17 September – Wale Field and woodland path, Little Shelford 15 October – Dernford Lake

CAMPAIGNS/CONSULTATIONS

You might be interested in the <u>'Stop the Arc'</u> group, who are campaigning for "an end to the Oxford-Cambridge Arc while supporting fair, democratic, local development"

Greater Cambridge Partnership: Busway through green belt in Shelford/Stapleford. The consultation has been relaunched, and the closing date extended. There is considerable local opposition to these plans, including from our MP Anthony Browne. In a recent email, Howard Kettel of Stapleford PC wrote:

- Our take is that Option 1 is preferable because Option 2 creates an infill site ripe for development, which option 1 does not create. This is perhaps the most significant consideration. It's also worth noting that the more detailed plans illustrate how the busway carves a much bigger area of uneconomic farmland behind the houses on Haverhill Road, all the way from the busway stop through to the Granary and then on towards Sawston.
- It's worth pointing out that we don't want the busway here anyway because it would work better as bus lanes along the A1307 with a busway direct into Cambridge Biomedical Campus, and so avoid damage to the chalk hills and the countryside park.
- It's also worth noting that a couple of footpaths are planned to cross the busway in order to link the retirement village to the countryside park; with all the implications for older or less mobile residents trying to cross safely.

BRINGING DOWN THE CARBON COST OF LIVING

We are all aware that carbon emissions must reach net zero to prevent runaway climate change. Heating our homes is a recurring (carbon) cost, and home retrofitting is an effective way of bringing this down.

2G3S has arranged two talks on this topic: on heat pumps by Warren Pope, a seasoned building professional and retrofit expert, on 5 September; and on home retrofitting by me (by no means a building professional) on 3 October.

My retrofit journey started when I got a home energy display. It made me acutely aware of our energy consumption and I was mesmerised by the stream of numbers. The game of bringing these down quickly caught on! It led to fitting solar panels a year later, another device producing many numbers to look at.

When the opportunity arose to extend our 1940s semi, I wanted this to be the starting point of a whole-house upgrade instead of increasing energy consumption. Little did I know this would take many years to complete!

I managed the build and chipped in with specific eco jobs, doing a lot of homework to better understand low-energy retrofitting practices.

The result is almost complete, and I want to share my experience with you because, besides the lower fuel bills, I am over the moon with the transformation in comfort. In winter, we used to huddle in the living room and have blankets within reach, and in summer we would swelter. Now, the whole house is at an even temperature throughout the year: warm in winter and cool in summer, at a fraction of the carbon footprint.



With my talk I hope to enthuse, motivate and empower you to start retrofitting your home and begin enjoying the benefits!
