


Bookings are open until Monday 13th November,

Book Club - Tuesday 21st November



We will be meeting on 21st November to discuss "Islands of Abandonment" by Cal Flyn.

The author gives first-hand accounts of her sometimes perilous visits to places around the world that for different reasons have become depopulated and abandoned by human society, to witness how they become unintended habitats for wild plants and animals and develop their own ecosystems.

These abandonments are in some cases the unintended results of actions by our species (including acts of war, social inequality, pollution) and in others caused by natural disaster, but the speed at which nature regenerates in all these spaces is astonishing.

The conclusions are mixed - on the one hand it is heartening that nature can occupy and thrive even in seemingly inhospitable and "unnatural" landscapes, without any help from us - but there is also a feeling of foreboding that our populated spaces are increasingly at risk of becoming future examples of abandonment as climate breakdown continues.



A group called Cambridge Parents for Sustainable Travel are still pressing for some positive action; some of us signed the open letter they recently sent to the political decision-makers (you can still sign this, and/or write to your County Councillor. The CPST say "Our open letter expresses our disappointment at the failure of our politicians to support the Sustainable Travel Zone or any alternative plan to decongest our City. There has so far been no answer from councillors. We need to pile on the pressure and let them know that doing nothing is not an option. Please <u>share the letter</u> with family and friends encouraging them to sign".

Reports on Recent 2G3S Events

Planet Local: A Quiet Revolution

On 15 October we arranged a film evening in Whittlesford as a joint venture with Whittlesford Eco. We started with a short: 'The Story of Solutions', which in the entertaining way we have come to expect from 'The Story of Stuff' stable, put the idea that our economic goal should not be 'More', but 'Better', and that we should work together to establish an alternative way of doing things more conducive the health of both ourselves and the planet.

Our main film, the 'Local Futures' documentary 'Planet Local', started with a similar premise and criticised the way the world economy is currently set up to prioritise big over small, standard over diverse, exploitative over sustainable. But then it went on to show how communities all over the world are getting together to make their lives better – in the words of the trailer: 'an inspiring glimpse of the future we long for'. The mantra was 'localisation, not globalisation'.

After some refreshment we discussed how we could help empower our own communities; we thought of many examples of group activities already happening (eg Repair Cafes, Farmers Markets, feast days and fetes etc) and had ideas for other things we could do (at random: Library of Things; revive old customs such as beating the bounds, Sawston Pea Picking).

We shall discuss these ideas in our respective groups. There is also a suggestion that a more fundamental discussion of the basic tenets of the film (eg: is globalisation all bad? Hasn't it led to prosperity for many? How many people in the West actually want to grow their own food?) would be interesting and we may set this up. If you are interested, get in touch.

Re-imagining Community Energy - 22 October



This deservedly well-attended event was the result of months of preparation by Claire Lord of 2G3S, Michelle Golder of Haslingfield and Harlton Eco Group, Alice Vodden of Cambridge Carbon Footprint, and Elena Moses of XR.

The aim of the event was to share knowledge about community energy projects and how to go about setting one up. There are a surprising number of such projects in our area, in play or being proposed, with considerable overlap with other community oriented initiatives.

The organisers have produced a document pack as a resource for anyone interested in setting up a community energy scheme, and given the success of this event it is likely that follow up events will be organised in future. We will post a fuller report on this event on our website in due course.

Other News

Trees for Cities



You may have heard of this charity from an article in a recent Waitrose magazine. In the 30 years it has been running, it has planted 1,765,366 trees, over 200,000 in 2022-23 alone. They have now planted trees in 10 different countries, including Ethiopia, Peru, Kenya and Nepal. The charity aims to make urban communities more resilient to environmental threats by planting a range of tree species. Trees reduce temperatures in hot summers, absorb air pollution by roads, create shade, create wildlife habitats, and there is evidence that being in green spaces improves mental health.

If you would like to help, it costs just £6 to plant a tree in one of the charity's urban forests. See <u>treesforcities.org</u>. Or plant a tree in your garden (of appropriate size, obviously). It's a good time of year to plant a tree, and the local nurseries and garden centres should have a good choice and can give advice. A good idea for a present?
